Relationships: Positive and respectful relationsips prevail across the school. A recent school-wide emphasis on promoting virtues is clearly evident in the context of writing programmes. These virtues are reinforced by teachers, well understod by students and form the basis for effective behaviour management practices. Safe, calm and purposeful learning environments strongly support teaching and learning in writing.
